






The Shizuoka City Museum of Art, opened in 2010 on the third floor of the Aoi Tower at the north exit of JR Shizuoka Station, marks its 15th anniversary this year. The museum's guiding principle is "to create and offer art and culture that energises people and the local region." Having exhibitions and communication programmes at its core, we continue to be as active as ever, aiming to be a museum like an "open space in town."

Communication Programmes

The entrance hall, where the Museum Shop and Café are located, the multi-purpose room and the workshop room are collectively called the "Communication Zone". Various outreach programmes are held here, including presentations and lectures on diverse art scenes, symposiums, concerts, screenings of art films, and workshops. Also, "Museum Classes" - art appreciation sessions for school groups - are coordinated for each exhibition.

Portraits of the Seasons: The World of Ono Chikkyo

—Masterpieces from the Chikkyo Art Museum, Kasaoka

April 12 (Sat.) — May 25 (Sun.), 2025

Japanese-style painter ONO Chikkyō (1889-1979) was born in Kasaoka City, Okayama Prefecture. For around 75 years after entering the studio of TAKEUCHI Seihō at the age of 14 in 1903, Chikkyō kept vividly and distinctly depicting the subtle expressions of nature seen in the changing seasons. He then reached a new ground in the theme of sunset where he was able to express the ever-changing face of the sky and clouds with colours full of lyrical sentiment. Such artistic achievement led Chikkyō to receive the Order of Culture in 1976. This exhibition highlights the culmination of Chikkyo's lifelong pursuit of expression of nature through a selection of masterpieces from the Chikkyo Art Museum, Kasaoka.

Secrets of the Kimono: The Advent of Yuzen Dyeing

October 25 (Sat.) - December 21 (Sun.), 2025

Kimono is a traditional Japanese garment. While holding a substantial flatness through the fabric sewn in straight lines, various designs added to it brings the kimono a three-dimensionality when worn. This back-and-forth between flatness and three-dimensionality is where the allure of kimono lies, and is different from Western clothing, which is made using three-dimensional cutting from the start. Focusing on the collection of CHISO, a long-standing yuzen (paste-resist) dyeing establishment, this exhibition showcases kimono from the early modern and modern periods, pattern books reflecting the fashions of the time, paintings by MARUYAMA Okyo and other modern Kyoto painters, and craftworks. Through these items, the exhibition surveys the background to kimono design and the ingenuity of the creators to unlock the "secrets of the kimono" from a new perspective.

Paul Klee, Solitary and Solidary

June 7 (Sat.) — August 3 (Sun.), 2025

Paul KLEE (1879-1940), born near Bern, Switzerland, is known for works that are abstract yet have poetically rich stories. Often seen as a solitary artist in deep contemplation, it is less known that KLEE's works were created through exchange with other artists of his time and through involvement in art movements. With the academic cooperation of the Zentrum Paul Klee in Bern, this exhibition reexamines KLEE's creative trajectory through around 60 works by KLEE from the Zentrum Paul Klee, the Kunstmuseum Basel and museums across Japan, along with works by KLEE's contemporaries, such as Wassily KANDINSKY, Pablo PICASSO, and Joan MIRÓ.

The World of Kagakui Hiroshi:

The Picture Book Artist Who Has Made Children Smile All Over Japan

January 10 (Sat.) - March 22 (Sun.), 2025

KAGAKUI Hiroshi (1955-2009) was the author of the Daruma-san picture book series, which has sold over 10 million copies and is widely loved by children. Making his debut at the age of 50, KAGAKUI published 16 picture books in the 4 years until his sudden death from illness. He was a teacher at a special needs school and devoted to creating picture books that would make everyone smile, based on the knowledge and experience he had gained at the school over the years. This exhibition, the first major retrospective since his death, explores KAGAKUI's trajectory and the charm of his picture books. The exhibits include the original illustrations for all 16 of his picture books, as well as invaluable items such as author's notebooks and video recordings from his time as a teacher that became the source of his creativity.

Yunoki Samiro: The Eternal Now

August 16 (Sat.) — October 13 (Mon.), 2025

YUNOKI Samirō, Tokyo-born dyeing artist, sadly passed away in January 2024 at the age of 101. After encountering the Mingei (folk art) movement led by YAN AGI Soetsu, YUNOKI embarked on a dyeing career under the guidance of SERIZAWA Keisuke. YUNOKI is also an artist who had an association with Shizuoka, where he spent his apprenticeship in Shimizu and Yui. This exhibition offers a comprehensive overview of YUNOKI's diverse activities beyond the boundaries of genres with dyeing as the primary focus, through approximately 300 items including dyeing works, prints, original illustrations for picture books, and three-dimensional works. YUNOKI's work, inspired by the joy found in daily life, illuminates the preciousness of the "here and now" and underscores what is worth cherishing. We invite you to enjoy the free-flowing forms and beautiful colours.



Museum Logo and 15th Anniversary Logo

The museum logo features a motif of Mount Fuji, symbolising Shizuoka and Japan. The 2 overlapping circles signify the growing network of people around the museum, and the connection of the local region with the world. Through the varying depths based on perspectives, the logo also reminds us of the fascination of looking.
